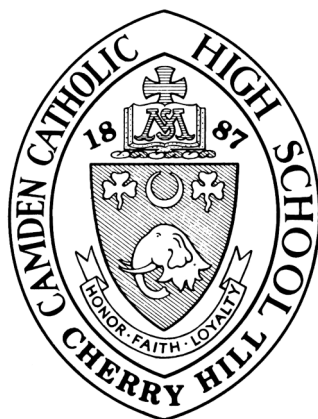

ROSEMARY BARBER-MADDEN

Class of 1958

Rosemary Barber-Madden grew up in Maple Shade, NJ and was a member of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish there. Like many other students in the comfortable decade of the fifties, Rosemary came to Camden Catholic High School for her high school education and graduated with the class of 1958 along with fellow Hall of Fame members Admiral Joseph Strasser and Actor/Agent TJ Lizzio Escott. The Sisters of Mercy, not surprisingly, were a strong influence on Rosemary during those years because “they believed in us, not just because we were their students, but that we were an integral part of the school’s values and they expected us to carry those values forward in life”.

It was a summer job after junior year at Lourdes Health System that clarified for Rosemary a desire for a career in health services and care. After Camden Catholic she attended St. Francis School of Nursing in Trenton and after graduation returned to Lourdes Hospital, eventually serving as head nurse in Labor and Delivery. Then an opportunity to work in public health as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Brazil changed her career and interests. Since then Public Health became the focus of her life’s work. She earned a BA in Health Education from New Jersey City University in 1968, a Master’s in Public Health from Hunter College in 1977 and a Doctorate in Health Education and Public Administration from Temple University in 1981.

Rosemary enjoyed a distinguished career for sixteen years as a Professor of Population and Family Health at Mailman School of Public Health, Columbia University, where she currently holds the title of Professor Emerita. Of special note during her years at Columbia was her nomination to fellowship at the New York Academy of Medicine. Typically the Academy only named medical doctors as fellows. A small group of five public health non-physician researchers were nominated to fellowship for the first time in 1986. Rosemary Barber-Madden was among those five!

Following her time at Columbia University and because of her expanding career in global health Rosemary held the prestigious position as the country representative for the UN Population Fund for six years first in Africa during the war in Angola and later in South America. After retiring from the UN in 2004, the Ministry of Education of Brazil offered a Visiting Professorship at the University Center for Multidisciplinary Study, University of Brasilia where Rosemary led a study of the impact of government social and health programs on improving work opportunities and health services for youth and young adults.

Dr. Rosemary Barber-Madden is recognized internationally as a senior global health and development professional with extensive success in program development, management and evaluation. To say that her impact is global is an understatement. Rosemary has worked in Angola, Argentina, Barbados, Bolivia, Central African Republic, El Salvador, Ethiopia, Guinea-Bissau, Honduras, Kenya, Lesotho, Montserrat, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru, Portugal, Rwanda, Senegal, Sao Tome e Principe, South Africa St. Kitts, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Tanzania, Trinidad, Uganda, Uruguay, US Virgin Islands, Venezuela, Zambia. Besides English, she is fluent in Portuguese and Spanish with basic skills in French. She is the author and co-author of multiple articles in professional publications on global health issues.

Though now semi-retired, Rosemary still accepts consulting assignments and the world is still her workplace. She is one who, in her own words, “embraces the wonderful surprises of life”.

RUDOLPH CAMISHION, MD

Class of 1945

Now a resident of Cinnaminson, New Jersey, Rudolph Camishion grew up in Riverside, New Jersey and made the daily trip into the city of Camden to attend Camden Catholic High School. Known as “Rudy” during his high school days at Camden Catholic, he was a member of the Science Club, the Glee Club, was recognized for his talent as a piano player, and provided some fun times for his classmates as the chairman of dances and parties, so says the write-up under his yearbook picture!

Upon graduation in 1945, despite his interest in aviation and the Navy, Rudy attended Saint Joseph’s College (now University) and earned a Bachelor’s degree in Science. Then followed medical school at Jefferson Medical College where he was a member of the Alpha Omega Alpha Medical Society and received his medical degree, graduating with honors.

Dr. Camishion interned at Cooper Hospital, then returned to Jefferson where he served as a resident physician under the late Dr. John H. Gibbon, Jr., a renowned surgeon who invented the heart-lung machine. As a young doctor at Jefferson he participated in the development and use of this life-changing heart-lung machine. He remained at Jefferson Medical College Hospital until 1968, serving as Professor of Surgery and in various other capacities there. His final post there before becoming affiliated with Cooper Hospital was as Head of Cardio-Thoracic Surgery.

In 1968 Dr. Camishion joined Cooper Hospital/University Medical Center where he served for the next twenty years as Chief of Surgery. In Cooper Hospital history, 1968 will be remembered as the year of the hospital’s first open heart operation. For the first patient and the thousands to follow, the operation would mean relief from persistent chest pain and enforced inactivity, and for many a resumption of nearly a full, active life. Open heart surgery was relatively uncommon in 1968. The world’s first successful open heart surgery had been performed fifteen years earlier at Jefferson where, as has been mentioned, Dr. Camishion was a resident physician. It was the heart-lung machine that made these surgeries possible by artificially replacing functions of the heart. The heart, at rest, can then be treated surgically.

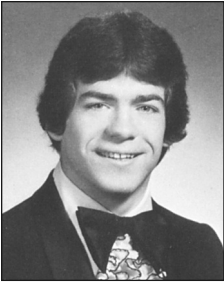
In addition to his role as Chief of Surgery at Cooper, Dr. Camishion served as Professor and Head, Department of Surgery at the College of Medicine and Dentistry, Rutgers Medical School at Camden, NJ and was a strong proponent of basic research at Cooper. In a 1984 article on developments in cardiovascular surgery at Cooper Hospital, Dr. Camishion is quoted “With new faculty people coming in with research backgrounds, we can look forward to technical breakthroughs originating here at Cooper, and we can become leaders rather than followers in the development of medical technology.”

Dr. Camishion has been recognized for his contributions to the advancement of medicine. But more importantly, he is recognized for his lifelong selfless devotion and dedication to helping others in the service of their health care. Throughout his career he was supported and encouraged by his wife, Nancy, who passed away in 1994. Together they raised six daughters, four of whom followed their father with careers in the medical field, one a doctor, two nurses, and one hospital social worker. As the quintessential medical professional, Dr. Camishion continues to tell his daughters how much he loved what he did in his life. To them “He really is one of a kind!”

TIMOTHY KLAUDER

Class of 1978

While Tim Klauder now lives in Wesley Chapel, Florida, he was born and raised in Berlin, NJ. And even though his family home was a distance from Cherry Hill, NJ, Tim was sure to continue the tradition of attending his family's high school of choice, along with his ten siblings, and enroll in Camden Catholic High School in the fall of 1974.

Tim was an ordinary, average Camden Catholic High School student; he was a homeroom representative, played four years of football, was on the varsity wrestling team, successfully completed all his academic requirements and graduated in 1978. However, after graduation, through dedication, hard work, great curiosity, creativity, and a fanatical interest in food, Tim rose from a student at Camden County Vo Tech to one of the most successful and most honored chefs in the profession.

The year following his graduation from Camden Catholic, Tim accompanied Mr. MacDonald on the school trip to Europe. The Italian guide on that trip immediately noticed his curiosity about food and wine and began to mentor him. She eventually secured for him an apprenticeship with a Michelin 2 Star restaurant in Florence, Italy, Ristorante Leo. That apprenticeship was followed by another in Anzere, Switzerland at the 3 Star 3 Diamond Hotel Zodiaque. In both apprenticeships Tim worked with world renowned chefs.

In 1981 Tim returned to the States to attend the New England Culinary Institute in Vermont from which he graduated in 1984. In 1993 he was honored by that Institute with its **Distinguished Graduate Award**.

Chef Klauder worked for several prestigious chefs, among whom was Chef Johnson, Executive Chef of Air Force One and Chef Paul Bocuse at a number of his restaurants in France. He himself was the Executive Chef of the award winning 5 stars, 5 diamond Grand Bay in Coconut Grove, Miami, Florida. He then had the opportunity to still practice his craft but work as a corporate chef for a company that manufactures professional kitchen equipment, Blodgett Oven Corporation. In that position Tim could teach chefs how to use equipment by cooking with them and by helping design kitchens for chefs and owners in many parts of the world. This also had the added benefit of more regular hours than most chefs have allowing him to enjoy the value of family that was so important to him.

His honors and awards are numerous. In 1990 Chef Klauder was named among the Top Ten Corporate Chefs from Chefs in America, The Golden Medal of Honor from the American Culinary Federation Chapters of New England, Chef of the Year from the Electric Cooking Council, and the Bocuse d'Or Certificate. In 2007/2009 Chef Klauder was granted 2 patents for professional cooking devices. In 2017 Chef Klauder was inducted into **The Honorable Order of the Golden Toque** (chef's hat), founded in France and brought to the US in 1961, it is the highest acclaimed recognition a chef can receive in America and consists of 100 lifetime members.

When he retired in 2017 from the Blodgett Oven Corp. he became Executive Chef at Artistas Café, a non-profit that trains young people with autism to be able to work in the food service industry and transition to independent living. Tim has volunteered with this organization for many years teaching young adults to cook, now devoting much more time to it with a permanent position.

Tim is an active volunteer, contributor, and fundraiser to the Saint Vincent de Paul Society of Hillsborough County, following in his father's footsteps with the Camden branch of this service organization.

PAULA M. KREBS

Class of 1976

A young freshman named Paula Krebs came to Camden Catholic High School from Saint Cecilia's Grammar School in 1972 and began an educational and intellectual journey that can only be characterized as extraordinary. She remembers fondly the teachers at Camden Catholic who encouraged inquiry, not passivity, and who lit a fire in her that continues to burn today. Before Paula graduated in 1976, she took advantage of all that Camden Catholic had to offer. She excelled as a student, was a member of the National Honor Society, played field hockey, basketball, and soft-

ball, edited the school newspaper, *The Shamrock*, and participated in a number of club activities as well.

After graduation in 1976, Paula was the first in her family to attend college and went to La Salle College (now University) on a Christian Brothers Scholarship. She graduated with a BA in English (cum laude) with General College Honors in 1980. Her journalism experience (sports writing) for the *Courier-Post* motivated her to move on to scholarly journals and a fellowship at Indiana University where she eventually earned a Ph.D in English (Nineteenth-century British and American Literature) in 1991. While pursuing her doctoral course work she kept up her sports writing for the *Bloomington Herald-Telephone*. Before finishing her degree Paula also spent three years in Washington, DC, at the National Science Teachers Association, editing a magazine for high school science teachers.

Her first job out of graduate school was as an Assistant Professor of English at Wheaton College in Massachusetts, where she taught Victorian Literature for 21 years. During her tenure at Wheaton College Paula began to make an extraordinary impact on higher education as it relates to the minority population and to feminist issues. At Wheaton, and as a consultant to other colleges, she worked to increase the hiring and retention of minority faculty members. She designed and directed a national institute to help prepare minority students to pursue doctorates in English so as to become college English teachers. Also during her time at Wheaton, Paula wrote a book about the 1899 South African War, entitled *Gender, Race, and the Writing of Empire*, which was published in 1999 by Cambridge University Press, and co-edited *The Feminist Teacher Anthology*, published in 1998 by Columbia University Teachers College Press. In addition, over these many years, Dr. Krebs has published many scholarly articles about Victorian literature.

Leaving Wheaton College in 2010 Paula was selected to be an American Council on Education ACE Fellow and spent her fellowship year in the University of Massachusetts's President's office. She became the Dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at Bridgewater State University, drawn to that position because most of the students were first-generation college students as she had been. During her time as Dean, she organized a New England-wide Humanities Student Success group to bring together employers and faculty members to help make clear the values of humanities degrees for many different careers; she wrote articles for higher education publications about the issues of diversity and about the importance of the humanities. Last August Paula left the dean position and moved to New York to become the Executive Director of the Modern Language Association (MLA), the world's largest organization of higher education professionals which among other responsibilities advocates for the importance of studying the humanities, including language, literature, writing, folklore and other humanities disciplines. She continues her journalism work, writing for higher education publications about issues of diversity and about the importance of the humanities. She and her partner, Claire Buck, have a daughter, Ruth Krebs Buck, who will graduate from Macalester College in May.

As one of her Camden Catholic classmates writes, "she is the quintessential Hall of Fame package living the values and mission of Camden Catholic everyday of her life. She exudes faith in action...helping those less fortunate, especially focusing on diversity and gender equality issues. She is a scholar of the highest caliber and highly regarded in her field for her academic acumen and literary talent...Lastly she is a genuinely kind, humble, and giving person."

MAJOR GENERAL JAMES MCINTOSH, USAF RET.

Class of 1956

Now living in Kimberton, PA, James McIntosh grew up in Collingswood, NJ, and after eight years with the Sisters of Mercy at Saint John's Grammar School in Collingswood, it was no surprise that he would spend his high school years again with the Sisters of Mercy at Camden Catholic in the city of Camden. Today James McIntosh is happy to express his gratitude to those Sisters who for twelve years provided an education which instilled the values and ethics that he lives by today.

While his 1956 yearbook picture has "Mac" headed to Saint Joseph's College after graduation, Jim did not follow through on that prediction and instead went off to Drexel University in the fall following his high school graduation. After one semester at Drexel, however, Jim made a decision that would have a dramatic effect on the rest of his life. He entered the Air Force for flying training and continued his education as time and duty allowed, finally being sent by the Air Force to the University of Nebraska to complete his college degree in 1975. He explained his college degree to his children in this way: "I squeezed four years of college into twenty years." The truth is, however, he continually pursued formal education during those years and beyond, first in the US Air Force Squadron Officer School in 1964, the US Air Force Air Command Staff College in 1968, the University of Nebraska in 1975, The Department of Defense National Security Management Institute in 1982, and a Master's Degree in Business Education from Monmouth College, New Jersey, in 1982.

Major General James McIntosh entered the Air Force through the Aviation Cadet Program at Harlingen AFB, Texas, was commissioned and received his navigator wings in 1960. From 1960 as a Second Lieutenant he consistently rose through the ranks, First Lieutenant in 1963, Captain in 1967, Major in 1974, Lt. Colonel in 1978, Colonel in 1987, Brigadier General in 1993, and Major General in 1996. While on active duty he served on numerous assignments in the field and in headquarters staff positions. A Master Navigator with more than 6,400 flight hours, he flew over 100 combat missions as a navigator during the Vietnam conflict.

Among General McIntosh's numerous awards and decorations are the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Small Arms Expert Marksmanship Ribbon, Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross, New Jersey Medal of Honor, New Jersey Desert Storm Ribbon, and the New Jersey Governor's Unit Award. This list is NOT complete.

Before his retirement in 1999 Major General James McIntosh served as Commander, New Jersey Air National Guard, McGuire Air Force Base, NJ. He was responsible for the command and control of more than 2500 New Jersey Air National Guard members assigned to the 108th Air Refueling Wing, the 294th Weather Flight, both at McGuire AFB, and the 177th Fighter Wing at Atlantic City International Airport.

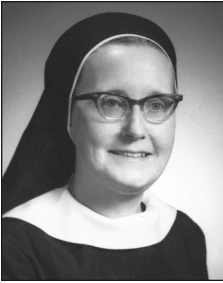
In retirement General McIntosh remains involved with Military affiliated organizations who advocate for military members and their families, scholarships for military dependents, and veteran benefits.

SISTER MARY WINIFRED THOMAS, RSM

posthumous

The Camden Catholic Hall of Fame posthumously celebrates the life of a valiant woman. A woman of strength, vitality, courage, and intellectual gifts. A woman who touched the lives of countless students and faculty who came to know her as a Sister of Mercy, a teacher, a mentor, an associate, friend, companion in Mercy and in the journey of life.

Catherine Thomas, as she was known before Religious life, did not follow that call directly from high school, though she had thought of doing so since she was a junior in high school. The call to learning and a love of books attracted her first, but a loving and persistent God was never far away and, in 1939, finally won her heart forever.

As Sister Mary Winifred she quickly established a reputation for high standards – in her classroom, in the library, in everything she did. She could organize, supervise and devise the ways and means to do almost anything – and she always did it with style. Her marvelous mind and a gift for making things successful were not lost on anyone. During her mission at Camden Catholic High School in the city of Camden she established a first class library which was destroyed in the 1960 fire. Archbishop Damiano, then Bishop of Camden, insisted that she remain a full time faculty member while the new school was being built lest another school “steal her away in the interim.” When Camden Catholic rose from the ashes in 1962 with the finest high school library in South Jersey, no one was surprised,

Sister Winifred’s reputation as a leader in the field of Library Science was well established. She was the spirit and drive behind the founding of the Camden County School Media Association long before professional librarians in schools were the norm and she was an active member of many national library organizations. Long after attaining her Master’s degree, she sought out opportunities to update her skills and to share new ideas with her professional associates.

Sister Winifred was a mentor to many students who went on to become doctors, lawyers, teachers, and engineers. She was a mentor to Pat Brown (Hall of Fame class of 2016) and was instrumental in her decision to study library and information systems at Drexel University, the same university where Sister earned her MS degree in 1955. Mrs. Pat Brown was the librarian at Camden Catholic for 35 years and continued to maintain the quality and high standards that Sister Winifred set. Pat took the library to a new level of quality with the introduction of computers and the use of technology into today’s academic program. Without Sister Winifred, there would not have been a Pat Brown librarian at Camden Catholic.

Sister also mentored and encouraged another faculty member, Mr. Dave MacDonald (Hall of Fame class of 2009) to use his Master’s degree in Communications to set up an Audio Visual Department at Camden Catholic and develop a curriculum in that field in the 1960’s. The result was an AV Department established to assist faculty in using instructional materials and equipment for student classes in Mass Media and Photography.

But what those who knew Sister Winifred well will remember best is her intuitive understanding of people. She just knew when someone was sick, or sad, or in need of a word of encouragement or a no-nonsense challenge. Her gift to her family, her loyalty to her friends, her marvelous sense of humor (usually delivered with an absolutely straight face), her love of her students, especially the poor and those with a propensity for getting “in trouble”, and her total confidence in the God who had and would always guide and care for her – these are the memories that will last a lifetime.

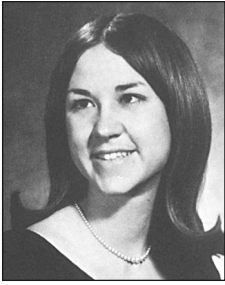
Sister Winifred retired from Camden Catholic in 1979, but continued working at Mt. Saint Mary’s Academy at the motherhouse and then at Georgian Court College until finally retiring in 1984 when she returned to the motherhouse where she passed away in 1996.

Raised in Cherry Hill, it was not a long trip in the fall of 1966 for Linda to travel to Camden Catholic High School from Queen of Heaven Grade School. Two things happened to her at Camden Catholic that seem to be fairly consistent with many alumni of that era: Linda met her best friend for life (“she sat in front of me in freshmen homeroom, and she has been there for me ever since”), and Linda was very much influenced by the Sisters of Mercy (“they were very caring and provided support for me during my time at CCHS”).

She also fondly remembers the legendary Mr. Phipps as someone who encouraged her and pushed her to excel at math during her years at CCHS. This interest in math found full expression in her career as a Certified Public Accountant and eventually Chief Administrative Officer for Ironbound Capital Management, an investment management firm in Princeton, New Jersey.

At Camden Catholic Linda was an excellent student graduating in the top ten percent of her class, and at graduation she received the Bishop George H. Guilfoyle Award for Academic Excellence. But it was her participation during her junior year in the Camden County Citizenship Apprenticeship Program that instilled in her an appreciation for volunteerism that has come to characterize her life.

After an interrupted college experience at Douglas College, Linda eventually returned to Rutgers as a part time student in the evenings, and by way of an Accounting 101 course finally found her career path. She received her BS in Accounting in 1978 and began work in the large accounting firm of KPMG. She was the Senior Manager in the Audit Department and the Director of Administrative Services. After sixteen years with that company, Linda left to become a partner in the local accounting firm of **Golubieski & Schilling**, CPA's from 1994 to 2004 when she became the Chief Administrative Officer for Ironbound Capital Management from which she retired in 2012. As a CPA in the state of New Jersey, Linda was a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and the New Jersey Society of Certified Public Accountants.

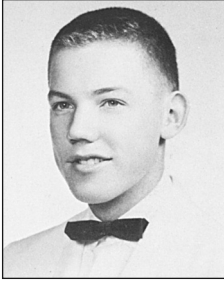
Linda has served Camden Catholic High School in many important leadership roles for over ten years. She has been a member of the Board of Trustees for that period, including Chair of the Finance Committee for many of those years. Additionally, Linda served for many years as the school's unpaid ‘business manager’, spending countless hours maintaining the financial and accounting records of the school as well as the indispensable role of managing the school's cash flow. When Camden Catholic created the formal position of Business Manager in 2010 Linda served as the primary mentor for the person(s) holding that position. And at times (sometimes for months) Linda served as the interim Business Manager/Chief Financial Officer for the high school.

In the words of a fellow alumnus, “Linda's untiring, voluntary service to Camden Catholic is without parallel. She has dedicated countless hours to managing the financial affairs of the school, navigating the important relationships with the Diocese and the school's independent auditor. Both in her role as a member of the Board of Trustees and Chair of the Finance Committee, and as an avid supporter of Catholic education Linda can be seen at many school activities, including the Hall of Fame ceremony, graduation exercises, the school plays and many other school functions....She has labored in relative obscurity, never seeking any recognition let alone remuneration for her efforts. Linda embodies the Camden Catholic spirit of Honor, Faith, and Loyalty.”

CHARLES REED

Class of 1960

Currently living in Chesterfield, MO, Charles Reed grew up in East Camden, New Jersey. In the fall of 1956 Charlie came to Camden Catholic High School from Saint Joseph's Parish and Grammar School. These institutions and some very special individuals and families nourished and instilled in Charlie a faith that shaped his entire life. Today he is an outstanding representative and example of a highly successful businessman **and** an exemplary Catholic gentleman. He is the president and founder of Electric Power Systems, established

in 1977. His company is a national leader in the electrical testing and power engineering field and he made certain that it reflects his personal values by incorporating the importance of family and service in the company's mission statement and through its significant charitable contributions to communities here and abroad.

Typical of most high school students, Charlie did not fully appreciate the dedicated services of the Sisters of Mercy during his high school years, but in retrospect he honors the Sisters for dedicating their lives to providing a strong academic secondary education and imparting Catholic values that influenced families for generations. His education at Camden Catholic "contributed to whatever success that I may have had in my life". He vividly recalls Sister Marcia's passionate lectures around the time of the launching of Sputnik in 1957 to encourage a commitment to studies and particularly in the sciences. He suspects this was his motivation to become an engineer.

After graduating in 1960, Charlie attended Villanova University, College of Engineering where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering. After employment at Public Service Electric and Gas Company in Moorestown, NJ and as an engineer for ITE Imperial Corporation in Philadelphia and then Sales Manager for ITE Power Supply in St. Louis, MO, Charlie made the most significant decision in his career. He resigned from a successful and promising career with an electrical manufacturing conglomerate to start up a one-man company. This was a daring decision because at that time Charlie had a family of five children, responsibilities with limited financial resources, and the challenges of a recession. But he also had a strong faith in his abilities and a deep faith in God's providence.

His company, Electric Power Systems, responded to an immediate demand for its services not only in the United States, but on projects in Ecuador, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Malaysia. Charlie's strategy for his company was to have an aggressive, yet controlled and steady growth with high quality performance and outstanding safety programs, resulting in the company's excellent industry reputation. Two of his sons joined the business and rose through the company by their technical and management skills to make it a truly family business. Consistent with his faith and values, however, Charlie always balanced family and business responsibilities, always ranking his family as his greatest success, and his wife, Mary Ann, whom he met in second grade and also attended Camden Catholic, as the most influential person in his life.

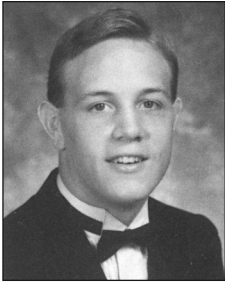

FRANK CORNELY

Class of 2000

Frank Cornely grew up hearing stories about Camden Catholic wrestling that echoed from his house in Pennsauken all the way to his dad's childhood home in Merchantville.

His father, Joe, wrestled for the Irish and so did his uncles, Tommy, Mike, Frank and Ed. His mother, Patty, also graduated from Camden Catholic, and she had many Schmidt family members who wrestled for the Irish, too.

So, truly, wrestling and Camden Catholic were in Frank Cornely's blood before he ever followed the bagpiper onto the Irish mat.

And so it is fitting that he will be forever remembered with his father as two of the great wrestlers in the legendary Irish wrestling program.

"I am extremely honored," he said about being inducted into the Camden Catholic Athletic Hall of Fame. "CCHS has had such a rich tradition of wrestling, going back as far as when my father wrestled there; he is a member of the 1974 undefeated team, which is also in the Hall of Fame. It is humbling, to say the least, to be a part of such an elite group."

Cornely certainly earned the distinction, as he was a state runner-up for the Irish in 2000 after winning both the region and district titles as a senior. And, although Cornely came from a wrestling family, he had to earn every take-down and pin in his storied career.

"Unlike most of the accomplished wrestlers in CCHS history who were successful throughout the entirety of their four year careers, Frank is a true Cinderella story," his uncle Ed said in nominating him. "Frank had a losing record as a JV wrestler his freshman year. But, he pushed forward, working tirelessly to improve, which he did in a big way. Through hard work, commitment, and dedication, Frank was elected captain his senior year. He was 37-0 when he entered the state finals, before finishing second. He then finished second in the senior nationals, the toughest high school tournament in the country at that time."

Cornely remembers the effort he expended to reach the podiums on the state and national levels. "The path down to the wrestling room to the 'House of Pain' and the tradition of hitting the shamrock that is displayed on the wall just before entering the room has always been a chilling experience," Cornely said when asked what he remembers most about wrestling for Coach Gary Papa.

Cornely's admirable and exhaustive work ethic carried him to the top of the collegiate wrestling world as well. At Duke University he was named the program's first All-American in 2005. He was a two-time Atlantic Coast Conference champion in 2004 and 2005 (only eight Duke wrestlers have won consecutive titles in the Blue Devils 80-plus-year history).

Cornely graduated from Duke as a two-time NCAA qualifier in 2004 and 2005 and 100 career wins. His stellar career extended past Duke as well. "I was competing free style for the New York Athletic Club," said Cornely, who competed internationally in six different countries, from his home in North Carolina. "I spent three semesters training with the Olympic national team at Colorado Springs. I wrestled in the U.S. Open and considered trying to make the U.S. team. I instead elected to go get a job."

Cornely, who is currently the vice president of credit sales for Fixed Income Capital Markets at US Bank, helped raise \$500,000 for the Duke wrestling team recently. "I'm still very close with the coach, I'm a big part of that program, in addition to Camden Catholic," he said.

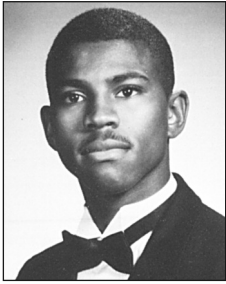
Frank and his wife Jenna, a Clemson graduate, reside in Charlotte with their five children: Isabel, 8, Neil, 6, Caleb, 3, Alexandria, 19 months, and Charlotte, who was born in February. "My kids have seen some video, but they are not quite old enough to appreciate it yet," Cornely said.

Cornely, who is looking forward to seeing many members of his large extended family at the Hall of Fame event, recalled his first day at Camden Catholic when teachers saw his name and gushed how they knew his family. "I was the first one of the kids to come back through Camden Catholic," he said proudly. And now he is rightfully joining his famous father in the Hall of Fame.

LOU HOLDER

Class of 1987

As an Eagle Boy Scout, Lou Holder learned to push himself to new heights and set goals seemingly too far to reach.

But on his way to earning his prestigious merit badges, it would be a stretch to think even Holder could dream of accomplishing all he has in life.

Already a member of the Rutgers University Athletic Hall of Fame after helping the Scarlet Knights to a pair of Final Four visits in four years as a varsity soccer player, Holder now joins the Camden Catholic Athletic Hall of Fame.

"I feel blessed to be in my college and high school Hall of Fames," Holder said. "I was told I was the first soccer player to go into the Camden Catholic Hall of Fame. I'm very happy to take my place in there as part of the school history."

Indeed, Holder is the all-time leading scorer at Camden Catholic with 72 goals. But he just didn't score goals, he played with a smile and energy that was infectious. He made his teams better by not only peppering the back of the net, but also by lifting his mates desire and ability to play with the same effort and love of the game.

He also played Irish basketball for four years and stays in touch with former Irish hoop players Rod Staton, Jeff Long, John Figueroa and Tim Dunne. "Basketball was just as fun as soccer," Holder said.

"It means a great deal to me," Holder said about the latest Hall of Fame honor. "When I entered Camden Catholic in 1983, I never thought I'd make such an impact on the school and soccer program. "It really means a lot to me, it was a special time in my life."

Holder, who lives in Maryland, is truly an all-around special person. He has also reached the pinnacle of his profession now that his playing days are over. He is continuing to soar as a long-time accomplished sportscaster with NBC SportsNet Washington. He also teaches mass communications and broadcast journalism at area colleges.

His professional peers also recognized his brilliance as he won an Emmy Award in 2004 for News Segment Feature. He has seamlessly gone from playing and starring in games to reporting on games and star players.

Still, even with interviews of top professional athletes to his credit, he recalls his own playing days at Camden Catholic in the mid-1980's as special. "My first scholastic goal," he said quickly when asked about his memorable Irish moments, "it was in my very first game, I started as a freshman, I was just so happy."

Holder rattled off a number of other memories as if he was still wearing the green and white with the shamrock on his chest. "We had a historic win against Pennsauken, who we hadn't beaten in eons, and I scored two goals and we beat them 3-2," Holder added about his junior year triumph. "It was pandemonium at school the next day." Holder continued counting other memorable games as "classic battles against Eastern and Bishop Eustace and Paul VI."

With sincere affection and admiration, Holder stays in contact with former soccer teammates Kevin Warner, Brian Shannon, Greg Phillips and Steve Boone. "The lessons Lou learned at CCHS are the basis for the path he has taken," said Boone in nominating Holder. "His work ethic on the field during his high school years is a precursor to the man he has become - hard working, humble, and a positive role model to his community."

During his time at Rutgers, Holder helped his team beat three No. 1 ranked teams and advance to the national championship game. That season with the Scarlet Knights Holder was a teammate of Olympian Alexi Lalas.

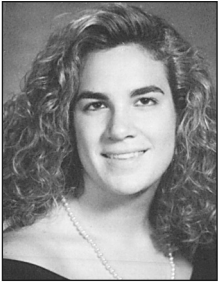

ANN CZERNIAKOWSKI RYCHLIK

Class of 1994

The historic success of the Irish girls swim teams of the 1990s is due in large part to 1994 graduate and team captain Ann Czerniakowski Rychlik. The team had its inaugural season just a few years before Ann entered CCHS as a freshman, yet the Irish swimmers were already making waves throughout South Jersey. Just prior to her Ann's freshman year, the team had stunned the South Jersey swimming community by winning the first-ever Irish State Championship in swimming in 1990.

Little did the team know the dynasty would continue as freshman Ann Czerniakowski entered in September of 1990 to help lead the Irish to several more titles in her four years at CCHS.

"When we won the state championship my freshman year, the team captain Ellen Disney, brought me up onto the block with her and we held the championship plaque together." At that moment, the senior was literally and figuratively passing the torch onto this young freshman to carry the team through the next three seasons, and that Ann did with grit and determination.

"What was enjoyable when swimming for CCHS were the state playoff and championship meets," Ann remembers.

During Ann's CCHS career, legendary Coach Mike Parker guided the Irish to three state championships in four years. Ann was named All-South Jersey twice, took first and second place in multiple events at the South Jersey Swim League Championships, South Jersey Coaches Invitational and the National Catholic Swim Championships. Her relay teams "always had so much fun," she remembers, and included Erin Whalen, Tamison Spears, and Dawn Deluca (who won first place in the state in the 400 freestyle relay). Additional relay teammates were Gwen Mayo, Dawn Sexton, Natalie Wolfinger, Vicki Branca and Mandy Burke.

Ann was among several Irish swimmers of her era to be a Division I recruit. She earned a scholarship to Big East power house University of Connecticut where she continued to earn accolades in the pool and the classroom, coached by Bob Goldberg.

"During my four years at UConn, the women's team won 1994-1995 and 1995-1996 New England Championships and the 1994-1995 and 1995-1996 Eastern College Athletic Conference Championships. I was a part of, and witnessed, a lot of exciting races," she recalls. Beyond this amazing swimming career, Ann counts one of her proudest accomplishments as being named to the Big East Academic All-Star Team in both 1997 and 1998.

Ann considers three people to be hugely influential to her, and her success: her father, who, she recalls "went to every meet with me, got up at the crack of dawn to either take me to practice or to a meet, became an official and worked many of my meets, watched me practice, worked hard so we could travel and get the expensive equipment that was needed, encouraged me the whole way, and drove to me to college visits so the right school could be chosen."

Her second great influence is close family friend and "second father" to her, former educator and Burlington County superintendent Walter Kries. "He had a passion for education and always fought for what was best for students and for teachers." Inspired by his passion for education, Ann has taken a similar professional path and now serves as Assistant Principal/Supervisor of Special Education at Shawnee High School.

The third person to influence Ann's success was the legendary Coach Mike Parker. Beyond her duties as a high school administrator, Ann also has coached swimming for over a decade, first for Seneca High School and now for Cherokee, no doubt inspired by her former coach. "Over the years Mike was a person who I could rely on for advice," she says. "As a new coach, I listened to everything he told me and used that when putting meet sheets together and in general preparing for new swim seasons. Last season I said to Mike, 'how do you play chess against the person who taught you to play?' I truly appreciate his guidance, but more important his friendship."

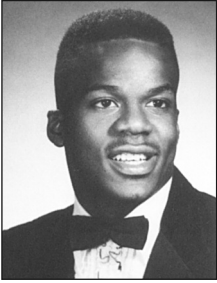
Ann has also coached at Ramblewood Swim Club and Jersey Wahoos. Her Cherokee team was the first in school history to make it to the state semifinals and Ann was named Courier Post Coach of the Year in 2010 and 2014, South Jersey Interscholastic Swimming Association Girl's Coach of the Year in 2013-2014 and 2014-2015, and NJ.com Public A South Section Coach of the Year.

With all of the career and coaching duties Ann is always sure to make time for "the biggest and most important accomplishment in my life," her four children: son Seamus (12), daughter Cameron (10), daughter Melanie (7), and son Kellan (5). "Their support along with that of my husband Matt over the years has enabled me to do the things that I have wanted to do."

WILLIAM WALKER, II

Class of 1991

William Walker, II is arguably one of the best athletes to ever grace the hallways of Camden Catholic High School. A prolific talent, he excelled in all three phases of the athletic calendar.

Will was a standout football and basketball player. Over his four year career, he helped lead Irish basketball to a 70-16 record, including serving as team captain his junior and senior seasons. One victory that particularly comes to mind for Will occurred during his junior year against a talented Pleasantville squad. At the time, Pleasantville was a top five team in South Jersey, and the unexpected triumph fueled the Irish for the remainder of the season. In his senior year, Will was selected First Team All-South Jersey, only the second Irish basketball player to achieve such an honor, and elected team MVP. Averaging 20.2 points per game, Irish basketball Coach Jim Crawford touts him as “by far the leader and best player on the 1991 team.” At the time of graduation, he held the school record for career points (1,184), surpassing the 35-year record established in 1956 by Ralph Bantavoglio. Currently, Will sits at 4th all-time in rebounds (655) and 12th all-time in assists (259).

On the gridiron, Will led Irish football to a 15-4 record over his junior and senior years. During those two seasons, he was an All-Conference and All-Parochial selection. As a junior, he earned Third Team All-South Jersey and moved up to First Team All-South Jersey his senior year. In addition to his fall and winter sport successes, Will had the power, speed, and jumping ability that enabled him to be named Third Team All-South Jersey in track.

Following his graduation from Camden Catholic, Will continued his education and football career at Syracuse University on a full athletic scholarship, competing for Head Coach Paul Pasqualoni. At Syracuse, he was a two time letterman and shared the field with the likes of Donovan McNabb and Marvin Harrison. Playing wide receiver and special teams, Will and the Orangemen won two bowl games: the 1992 Hall of Fame Bowl versus Ohio State University and the 1993 Fiesta Bowl versus the University of Colorado. Additionally, during the 1992-1993 season, Syracuse football was presented the Lambert Trophy, an award given to the top FBS team of the East. Will graduated in four years from Syracuse with a degree in Economics.

Will credits his parents as the most influential people in his career. He said, “Bill and Grace Walker showed me the meaning of hard work and determination.” Additionally, he claims Coach Crawford showed him the importance of the “mental side” of the game. This notion carried past his playing days and inspired him to become a coach.

A friend since Will was thirteen years old, President Emeritus Monsignor Martin states, “In addition to being bedazzled by his well-above average athletic skills on the football field and the basketball court, I watched Will through his high school and college years and beyond become a remarkable young man and adult.” Monsignor continues, “He goes out of his way to mentor young teenagers struggling through high school and athletics, and, together with his wife, he provides a loving and caring foster home for a young pre-teen in their Pennsauken home.”

Will has been married for 21 years and is the father of two children, Khia and Tre. He asserts, “My most important win is not on the athletic field; it’s marrying my high school sweet heart, my rock, my wife, Antionette Walker.”

2005-2006 GIRLS BASKETBALL TEAM



One day, before the 2005-2006 season, Chris Palladino was in her classroom when her Irish girls' basketball team came walking in and handed their surprised coach a present.

"They gave me a ticket," Palladino recalled, "and said it was my ticket to the state championship because we were going."

The Irish, however, just didn't go ... this prophetic team won the program's first state championship.

Rashidat Junaid, Jasmine Crew, Christine Matera, Katie Gallagher and Allison Lane were not only soothsayers, but also comprised one of the best starting five in South Jersey history.

In addition to being recognized as the top team in South Jersey, the Irish also soared to national prominence with a No. 22 ranking by USA Today.

Once again, the 2005-2006 Irish are being rightfully lauded, but this time closer to home and by their own.

Truly, the Irish were special. They were special delivering a ticket to their coach all the way through dominating into March when they doubled-upped the competition in South Jersey Non-Public A games over Monsignor Donovan (83-42) and Holy Spirit (70-30).

"Although we had some standout wins, including a come from behind victory over Bloomfield Tech at the MLK Day tournament at Cherry Hill East, a South Jersey No. 1 vs. No. 2 battle against Absegami, or Mrs. Pal's 400th win at home versus our bitter rival Woodrow Wilson, I would have to say my fondest memory was beating Holy Spirit in the South Jersey Finals," Matera said. "The game was touted as one to watch, and the papers even predicted that Holy Spirit would hand us our first loss of the season in an upset."

"Needless to say, we ended up handling the challenge."

The dominance extended into the state final when the Irish lapped Immaculate Heart 66-36. The season ended with a loss in the Tournament of Champions semifinals against powerful Bloomfield Tech 61-54.

Incredibly, Junaid set two Tournament of Champions single-game records with 24 rebounds and nine blocks. Junaid, who was a two-time first team Associated Press All-State selection, collected 2,085 points, which is ranked first all-time in school history, and 1,219 rebounds, which is first all-time for girls in her unparalleled CCHS career.

Crew and Matera also topped 1,000 points in their incredible careers for the Irish.

"I had wonderful classmates and tremendous teachers who challenged me in the classroom, but what we accomplished that year together will remain at the pinnacle of my memories of Camden Catholic," said Matera, who finished with 1,402 points to rank fourth all-time. "To follow through on our goal of getting Mrs. Pal her first State Championship is the high school accomplishment I'm most proud of."

The collegiate athletic careers of the starting five proved the Irish transferred what they learned from Coach Palladino to the next level.

Junaid played in Rutgers first NCAA championship game in 2007 among her 130 career games, which is ranked third in the program's history. She also finished sixth all-time in blocked shots (136).

Crew starred at Seton Hall where she was named All-Big East second team in 2012, finished first all-time for single-season free throws made and is ranked fourth all-time in single-season free throw percentage.

Matera was one of only seven women elected two-time captain in Harvard hoops history while helping the Crimson win the Ivy League title in 2008.

Gallagher went on to star on the Maryland lacrosse team, winning the 2010 NCAA championship as well as three Atlantic Coast Conference crowns. She received ACC All-Tournament Team and conference honors in 2011.

Lane and reserve Bridget Mahon both played soccer in college, at Jackson State and George Washington respectively.

And, Junaid and Crew continued to play after college. Junaid, who was selected with the No. 32 overall pick by the Los Angeles Sparks in the 2010 WNBA draft, played professionally in Russia and China, while Crew played professionally in Portugal.

Matera, who is ranked third all-time in career and fourth all-time in single season three pointers at Harvard, is now an assistant coach with the Irish.

“As reluctant as I am to talk about it, the current players often inquire about my playing days at Camden Catholic,” Matera said. “It’s an inevitability when the current team sees our picture in the Emerald Cafe or our season record hung above the locker room entrance. They ask about individual and team accolades, particularly from those who were on the state championship team, but the biggest thing I try to stress to them is how unselfish my teammates were.”

“Our team was talented and deep enough that our second five could have started for almost any other team in South Jersey, but individuals were willing to make sacrifices for the greater good of the team. From the seniors all the way down, everyone bought into what we were trying to accomplish as a team, and it paid dividends. I try to encourage our current players to emulate that same mindset.”

And, maybe in the future, when they are ready, to bring their coach a ticket to the state title game.

“I often reference that team, realistically they set the standard for the program,” Palladino said. “I speak about the key ingredients that the team had to make them special and winners.”
